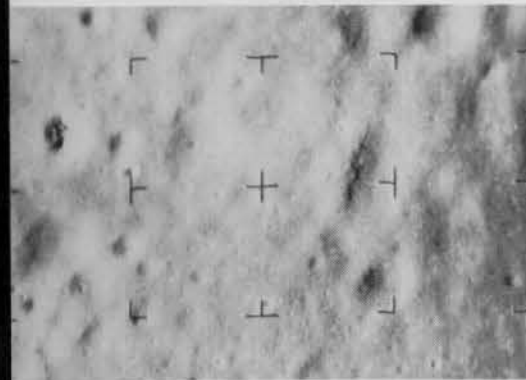

The smallest craters are about 30 feet in diameter and 10 feet deep. Some of the large craters are about 300 feet in diameter.

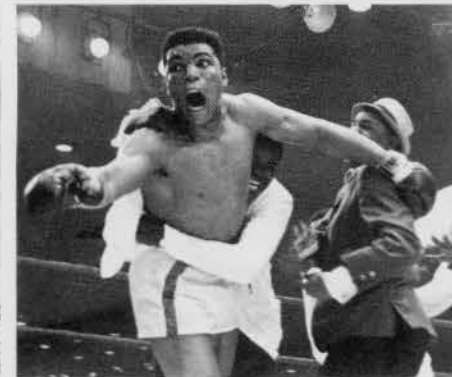

Highlights of the evening were a Latin American dance demonstration, and dance contests featuring the Charleston and the Twist.



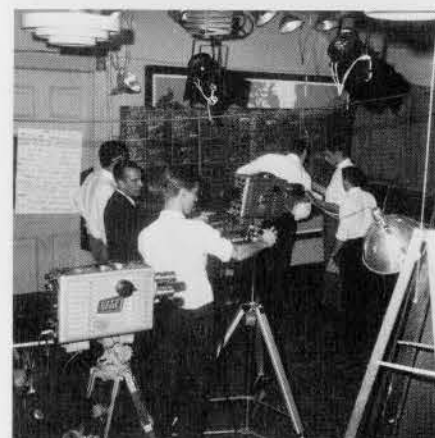
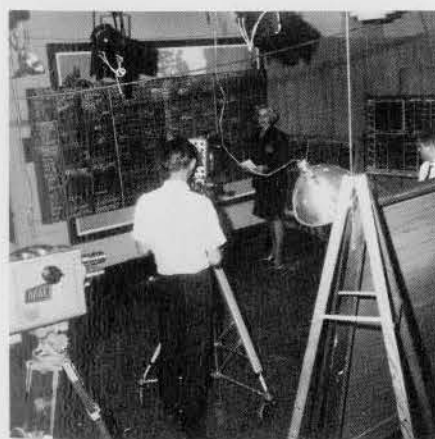
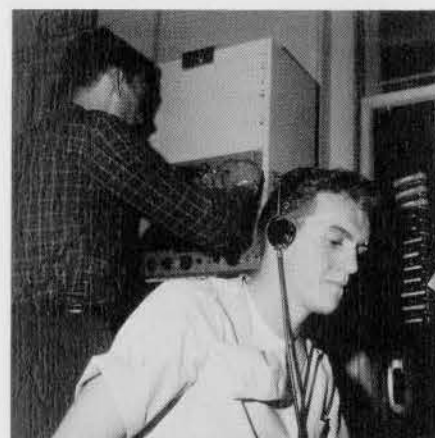
WCSB Election Night Coverage

WCSB Christmas Party

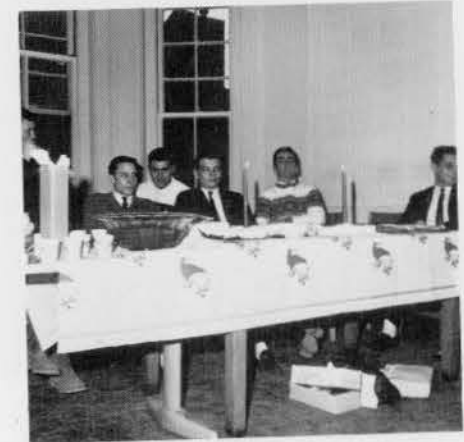

Kappa Sigma Beta has done and still is doing many worthwhile things. It is truly a fraternity of leaders.

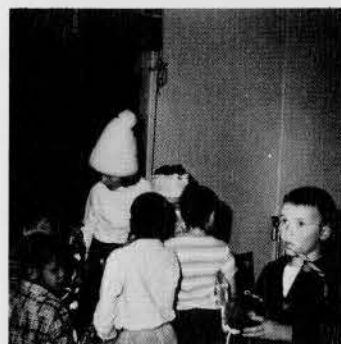

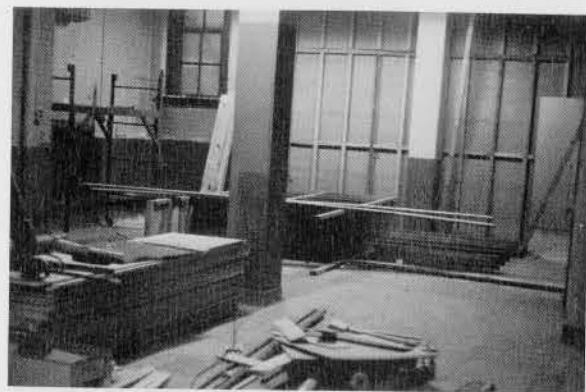
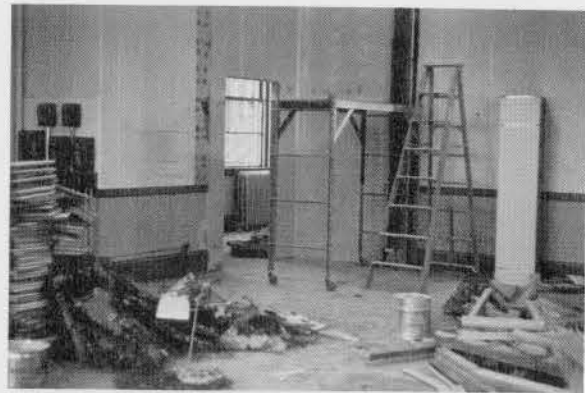

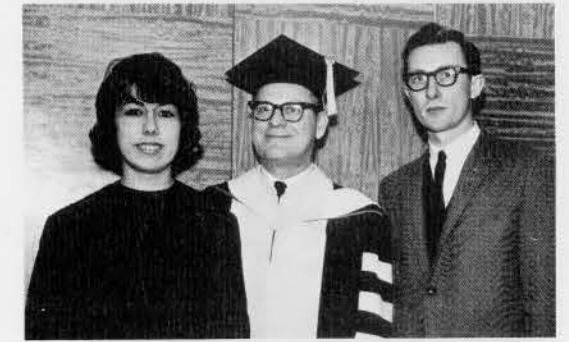
