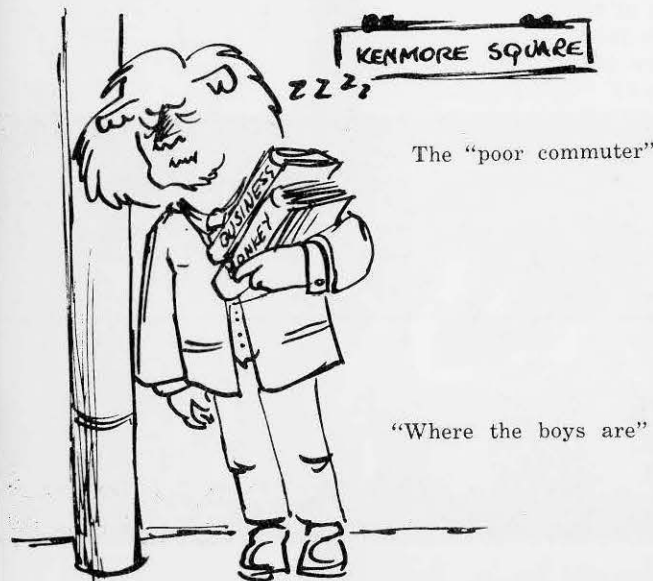

In the Best Tradition . . .

A battle-hardened retired admiral who is also a leading educator, fought back his tears Monday night as he saluted the nation's youth in an inspiring address.

Rear Adm John F. Hines, president of Springfield's American International College, had to struggle against his emotions because he was also saluting his fallen warrior son.

Only a few hours earlier, he had learned that Marine Capt Ralph E. Hines, 28, was killed Saturday in Vietnam. But he insisted on delivering the keynote speech at the Cambridge School of Boston honors convocation in John Hancock Hall.

He felt that if he yielded to his grief and declined to speak he would be letting down his son and the Cambridge School.

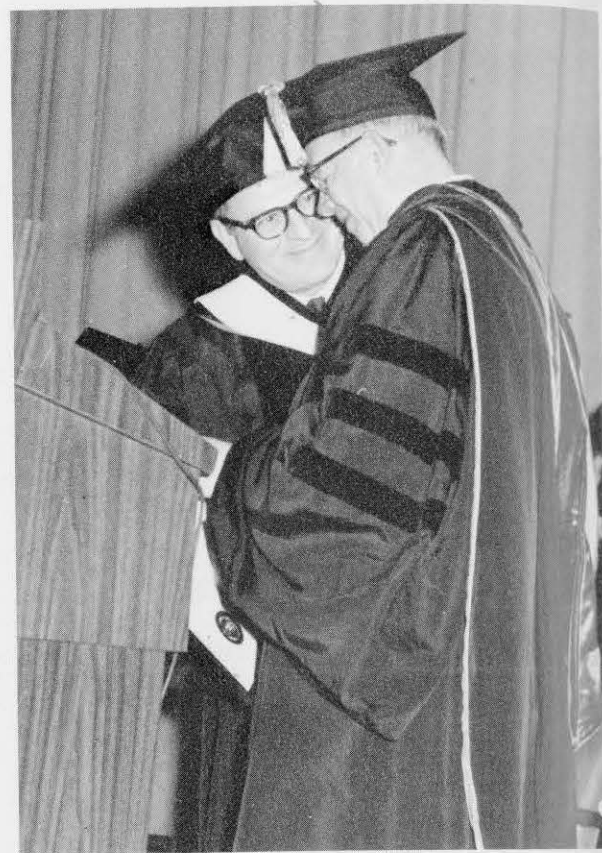
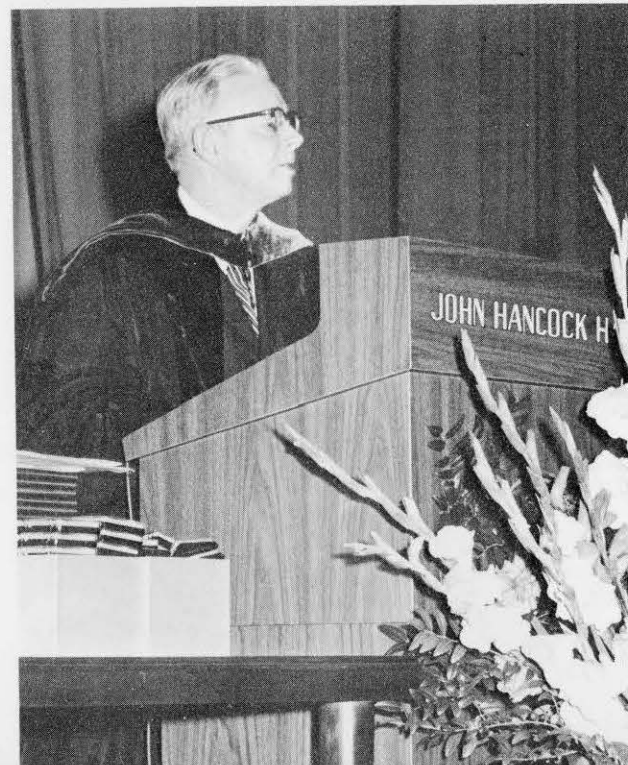
Before the ceremonies, Adm Hines—a decorated veteran of the Pacific sea war—dabbed at his eyes with a handkerchief, and his voice faltered, as he explained:

"What I have to say tonight isn't all that important, but it is important that a speaker show up at an event like this.

"And I think it's what my son would have wanted me to do."

Then the admiral straightened his shoulders, clad in black and purple academic robes, and marched with Cambridge school officials and honor students into the auditorium.

When he stood to speak, the slight, grey-haired Hines appeared composed. He made no reference to his son in the address. He spoke briskly, warmly, and spiced his talk with humor.

Ernest Hemingway probably said it best when he defined the word, "courage". "Courage, he said, "is grace under fire."

We can only hope that if and when we should come within range, we too can respond with as much, "grace under fire".

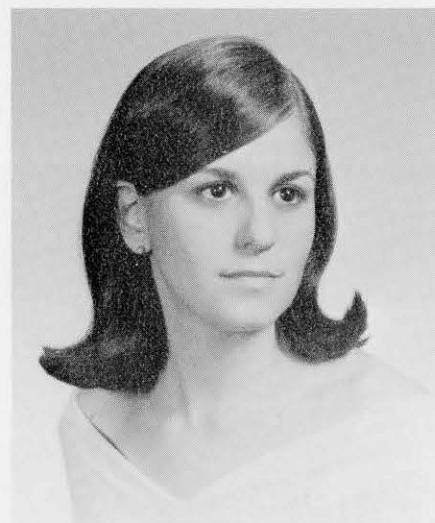
"Look to your left, look to your right", the speaker suggested.

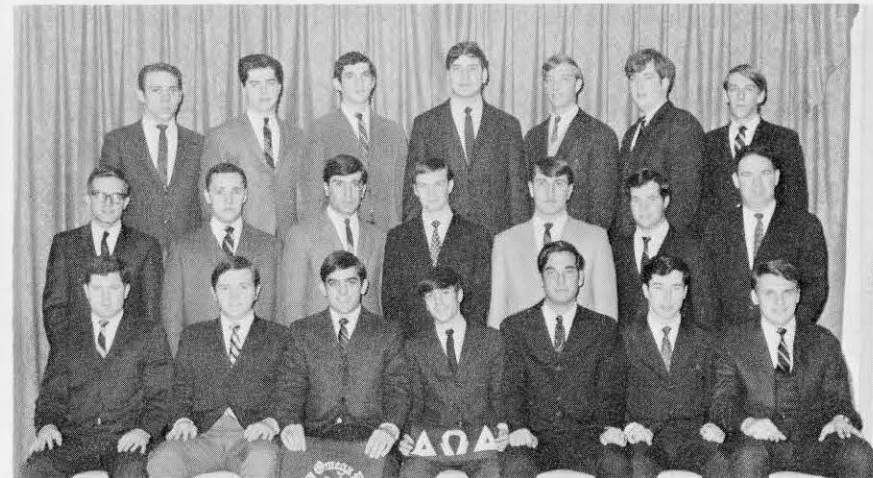

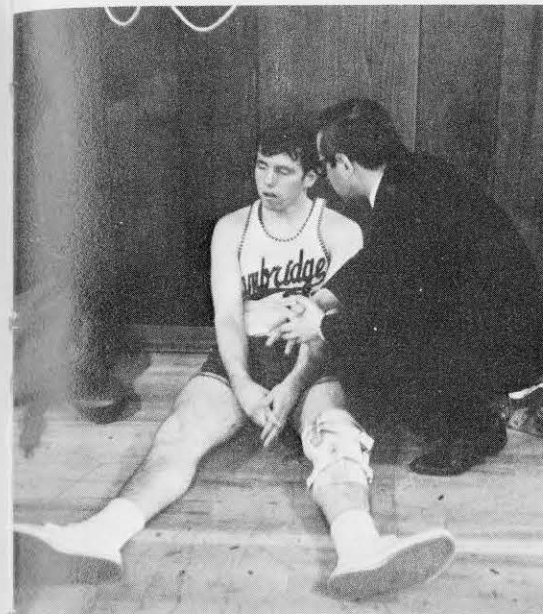
BASKETBALL
